* As some exams will take place in March/August, students need to apply for a visa that is valid until the end of March/August, since an extension of one month is in principle not possible.

Nomination and application information

Nomination	The University of Konstanz will only accept nominations via our Mobility-Online platform. Partners will be invited with log-in details. In exceptional cases, we might be able to consider later nominations and applications by your students. Please contact the International Office.
Language prerequisites	German or English proficiency at a minimum level of B2 (European Reference Frame). B1 competences are not sufficient to follow academic courses.
Application process	Students apply online (no-paper based application possible). Supporting documents (see below) need to be uploaded.
Required documents for admission from students (uploaded via our online system)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">– Transcript of Records– B2 language certificate (German or English)*– Copy of passport (page with photo)– Erasmus+ students with non-EU/EEA citizenship: copy of residence permit– Proof of housing deposit payment (copy of bank transfer receipt)– Non-EU students: Study Proposal - list of preferred courses for the exchange (to be completed in Mobility Online) *Native speakers of English or German do not need to provide a language certificate
Admission	Students will receive a letter of admission including information about their registration for the orientation programme directly through the online application portal.
Required documents for enrolment from students (uploaded via our online system)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">– Copy of both sides of EHIC (EU/EEA students) or German statutory health insurance certificate (non-EU/EEA students)– Proof of social contribution fee and GO-Konstanz course fee payment (if applicable)– Portrait photo (for student ID card)– Exmatriculation certificate from German university (if applicable)– Non-EU/EEA students with visa obligation: copy of long-term student visa for Germany– Proof of financial resources
Additional uploads to Mobility Online	As Mobility Online is the main tool for managing the exchange, students are asked to upload further documents also after their arrival, e.g. the entry stamp to the Schengen area to apply for a residence permit, or other documents. Students should make sure to regularly work with Mobility Online during their exchange.

COVID-19 information: Please note that we cannot yet predict how the Academic Year 2022–23 will be organized in detail. Students' presence in Konstanz during their exchange will be mandatory. Virtual exchange for students is not offered. The university tries to offer as much in-person teaching as possible. Most exams will take place in-person.

Orientation

Students choose between one of these programmes (mandatory):

GO-Konstanz (4 weeks)

March or September, intensive German language course with orientation programme (see OriPro), organised by the International Office and the Language Institute (SLI). Groups of about 15 participants are taught by experienced instructors up to level C1.

OriPro (1 week)

April or October, orientation programme shortly before the start of the semester: Information on course selection with coordinators of the departments, getting to know the structures of the University and applying for a residence permit for non-EU/EEA students.

Study with us

Courses

Courses are available in English or German. On Master's level, more courses are taught in English than on Bachelor's level. All courses offered in English [can be found on our website](#).

German as a Foreign Language

German language instruction is offered by the [Language Institute](#) on all levels in small groups: beginner, intermediate and advanced. Language classes should not take precedent over student's core study area, but complement their studies. The Language Institute will test the students' language competences on site and assign students to courses according to their individual language skills – results may be different than other test results, e.g. OLS. Students are not entitled to demand a specific level.

Courses for English as a foreign language are not open to exchange students.

Full-time study

Exchange students are required to complete a full course load. Undergraduate and graduate students are usually enrolled in 24–30 credits per semester. We recommend that students take at least 50 % of their classes in their main subject.

Transcript of Records

Upon completion of the semester/year, students request a Transcript of Records after entry of all results in the online system. The official transcript is then issued and uploaded to Mobility Online. We are currently not able to grant partner institutions access to the transcripts in Mobility Online. Study preparation

Webinars

Webinars covering final preparations and formalities before coming to Konstanz are offered before each semester. Students receive information and dates by email. Further information is [available on our website](#).

Accommodation

Housing application is included in the online exchange application. If students apply and pay a deposit of 550 € within the deadline, their application for accommodation in Seezeit student residences will be forwarded automatically. Since it is rather difficult to shorten the contract, we recommend a contract until end of July (summer semester) and end of February (winter semester). If need be, an application for the extension of a contract is possible. The private housing market in Konstanz is tight and expensive. There is no assistance for finding private housing in Konstanz, which is best found when on-site.

Study preparation

Visa and residence permit

Visa: Citizens from EU/EEA countries and Switzerland do not need a visa to enter Germany. Most other nationalities need a student visa to enter Germany for study purposes (no tourist visa). Apply ahead of time. Find an overview of which nationalities have to apply for a visa [here](#).

Residence Permit: All non-EU/EEA students with no long-term visa must apply for a residence permit ("Aufenthaltstitel") in Konstanz upon arrival. The necessary documents for the residence permit must already be uploaded to Mobility Online before arrival, as it is easier for students to care about those documents while still in their home country.

Students must prove that they have sufficient monthly funds to ensure their subsistence during their study period in Germany. The current monthly minimum to be proven is 861 €.

Health insurance

Students from EU/EEA countries and Switzerland are automatically insured through their EHIC card (GHIC for students from the UK). Students with non-EU/EEA nationality are required to enrol in German statutory health insurance before arrival. They should also take care of travel health insurance until the beginning of the semester.

Services

All exchange students are provided the same access to university facilities as local students, such as the 24/7 library, internet access on campus, accommodation in the Seezeit students residences, access to all sports facilities, psychotherapeutic counselling etc.

The [Student Service Centre \(SSZ\)](#) offers all important student services in one facility.

The [Welcome Centre](#) offers special services to PhD students and international researchers.

Exchange students may participate in our [Buddy Programme](#), the ESN Konstanz, our university orchestra and big band, theatre, film nights, Model United Nations, etc.
